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
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1. Executive Summary




The Certificate Course on Heritage (CCNHM) Management was organized in WII-C2C from 19th February to 15th March 2023 for International Participants sponsored by the Ministry of External Affairs - Indian Technical & Economic Cooperation (MEA-ITEC) Programme. In a first of its kind international course, the 12 participants of 8 countries (Costa Rica, Bulgaria, Ethiopia, Kenya, Tanzania, Madagascar, Sri Lanka and Mongolia) from 4 continents were taught principles and theory of heritage along with the ability to incorporate the same into their official roles and responsibilities. The course drew on Wildlife Institute of India's (WII's) expertise in the field of wildlife conservation and natural heritage management in addition to the global diversity of officer trainees to boost crosslearning. Through this 4-week course, the trainees were equipped with critical skills on themes like Concepts and Conventions, Heritage Management, and Heritage Interpretation. Classroom topics covered






Included Heritage Values – From Personal to Outstanding Universal Value; Nature-Linkages and Culture Sustainable Development; Managing Mountain World Heritage Sites; Human Dimensions of Natural Heritage Management; Visual Communication and Heritage and Interpretation Principles and Planning among others. Practical aspects of heritage management were also addressed through multiple field day trips (Wadia Institute, FRI and Rajaji National Park) and a 5-day field trip which included visits to the Indian Institute of Heritage, Archaeological Survey of India and 5 World Heritage Sites based in Bharatpur, Delhi and Agra. This international course provided ample proof that across the world, the challenge of sustainably balancing heritage promotion and protection remains and reinforced the need for focused study of nature-culture links, besides illustrating how natural heritage provides invaluable opportunities for interdisciplinary and cross disciplinary learning on site, in effect acting as a living classroom.











2. About CCNHM

A 4-week residential **Certificate Course in Natural Heritage Management (CCNHM)** from 19th February to 15th March, 2024 designed to:

1. Address the **growing need for professionals** trained in heritage conservation and management from across domains and geographies

2. Equip trainees with heritage concepts,

theories and practices with a focus on natural heritage **drawing on the expertise of the Wildlife Institute of India** and the WII-Category 2 Centre

3. Orient participants toward practical management and **effective interpretation** of heritage, particularly World Heritage, through a mix of presentations, group work, case-studies and field visits









4. Field Tour Reflections based on their individual observations during their visit to Delhi-Bharatpur-Agra































9. Shared Values


